We also offer our congratulations and bid a fond farewell to **Mrs. Sandra Ouelette**, who has taken a daytime caretaking position at **St. Peter's**.

Congratulations to our school community for contributing so much to the **K-ROCK** Thanksgiving Food. Our homeroom classes responded with incredible enthusiasm, ingenuity and generosity. The following HC home form classes collected the most food for their grade levels: **Ms. Fenrich's** Grade 9's, **Mrs. McLean** and **Mr. McCombs'** Grade 10's, **Ms. Waters'** Grade 11's, and **Mr. Prior** for the Grade 12's. **Holy Cross** came second in the city behind **QECVI**, but most importantly, we contributed to the **Religious Hospitalliers of St. Joseph's** efforts to feed the hungry in our own local community through the **Partners In Mission Food Bank**. Competition will never overshadow need and we know that the true intent of this drive is to share our resources with those in our community who are in need. We congratulate **QECVI** for bringing in an outstanding 14,175 pounds of nonperishable food items.

Thanks to the coaches, managers, community volunteers, and students for always making us proud to see the Green and Silver on the courts and fields. The **Students' Council** roused our school spirit with a wonderful **Pep Rally**. The **Fourth Annual Friday Night Lights Bill McLeod Memorial Catholic Cup** event was truly remarkable, a testament to our fierce Crusader pride as well as to undaunting support from the community at large, many of whom go without acknowledgement. We are grateful for all that everyone does to support **Holy Cross** athletics and all of our endeavours. Congratulations to our fall teams whose seasons have ended as well as to all of our teams working towards their seasons' completions.

On the Professional Development Day (**Monday, October 25th, 2010**), teachers and educational assistants gathered with our sister school, **Regiopolis-Notre Dame**, to learn from **OISE** professor **Garfield Gini Newman** about critical thinking and closing the gap between students who struggle in school and their peers who achieve at or above the provincial standard.

On **Friday, October 15th**, we issued our **Early Semester Report Cards** to students. This was an early indicator of each student's achievement in the first six weeks of this semester. The first half of the semester will end on **Tuesday, November 9th** and then on **Monday, November 22nd**, the **mid-semester Report Cards** will be distributed in Period One classes. This Report Card provides extensive reporting in each subject including: a percentage grade; course median; absences/lates; learning skills and personal comments on the individual student's strengths, weaknesses and next steps. There is ample time left in the semester for students to improve their marks and do well in each course. If a student's mark is below 50%, this indicates the need to examine the work to date. A discussion with the teacher will help you plan for maintaining the achievement level or ways to improve the student's mark. Teachers may refer some students whose progress is faltering to **Mr. Mike McAllister** or **Mr. Robin Dzierniejko**, our **Student Success teachers**, for what we call "**credit rescue**", an attempt to regain academic footing.

STUDENT ABSENCES AND THE PROVISION OF WORK

Ideally, students and teachers will be present throughout the school year. However, in reality, absences will occur from time to time. When teachers are absent, they often modify their lesson plans for the day and then make some adjustments upon their return. When students are absent, they need to follow a similar path. Students who are absent for legitimate reasons, such as illness or a school-approved excursion, should speak with their teachers at the earliest possible time and seek to find a way to get the lesson, and to either complete an assignment or a test as appropriate. In some cases, adjustments may need to occur (for example, a demonstration lesson will likely not be re-taught for individual students). Students who miss classes for legitimate reasons should not be penalized academically for these absences; however, it is up to them, in conjunction with their teachers, to get back on track as quickly as is possible. Many teachers have a web page from which students can access information; in other cases, students can check with peers to get a quick overview of what was covered. Students are reminded that doctor's notes are necessary for missing final exams. Family vacations should not occur during exam periods. When students are *going to be away for more three or more days* (in cases of illness, suspension, or some special event), they or their parents are encouraged to contact the student's guidance counsellor. The guidance counsellor will put out a notice to teachers and, within a school day, work should be available at day's end for pick-up at **Student Services**.

LATE BUSES

GRADE 9 PHYSICAL ACTIVITY PASS PROJECT

In the next few weeks, all of the grade 9 students in **Kingston** and surrounding area will be receiving a **free Community Physical Activity Pass** granting them access to all recreation facilities (i.e., pools, arenas, YMCA) in the city and local townships for the entire school year. A previous evaluation of the Pass revealed only 16% of the students used their Community Physical Activity pass, which was attributed to low student awareness due to lack of promotional activities encouraging the Pass. **Holy Cross** is participating in a project run by **Nipissing University** to evaluate the effectiveness of enhanced promotion of the Pass through grade 9 peer ambassadors.

ONTARIO YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM (OYAP)

"Apprenticeship is a training program of choice for more than 35,000 employers, 120,000 apprentices, and 300,000 active journeypersons in Ontario." Apprenticeship Training in Ontario: A Guide for Employers and Sponsors. June 2010

What is an Apprenticeship? – An apprenticeship is a hands-on training program for people who want to work in skilled trades or occupations. About 90% of an apprenticeship involves on-the-job training by employers; the remaining 10% involves theoretical training at a college or with a training provider. In Ontario, there are more than 150 trades in which a person may register as an apprentice.

There are three popular routes to an apprenticeship that include:

1. **Traditional Route** – The person seeking an apprenticeship is responsible for finding an employer who will sponsor him or her. The employer and apprentice register with the Ontario Ministry of Training, Colleges, and Universities Apprenticeship Office, sign a Contract of Apprenticeship, and the apprenticeship training period officially begins.
2. **Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program** – Senior students, with the help of their OYAP coordinator, register as apprentices while still in high school. These students complete a cooperative education placement in a skilled trade. They receive credit for the skills they develop and demonstrate to their employer during the apprenticeship. Some OYAP students can even receive credit for their (Basic) Level One in-school training. A successful OYAP placement can lead to paid employment and continuation of an apprenticeship after graduation. Interested students should speak with a guidance counsellor or cooperative education teacher at their secondary school.
3. **College Route** – Many of Ontario's colleges of applied arts and technology offer diploma programs related to skilled trades. These programs require successful completion of secondary school and can take two or three years to complete. As these are full-time programs, college tuition is required.

Steps to an apprenticeship following the OYAP route

1. Explore your career options with a guidance counsellor or coop teacher.
2. Research the topic carefully and talk to people who work in the field you are considering. Web sites www.oyap.com and www.apprenticeshipsearch.com are excellent resources.
3. If possible, enrol in an in-school technology course related to your chosen field. Discuss options with your technology teacher.
4. Enrol in a cooperative education course. Discuss this with your coop teacher.
5. Meet with an OYAP Coordinator to discuss possible apprenticeship pathways.

Who Should Consider OYAP? - Students who:

1. Are at least 16 years of age and have completed 16 credits.
2. Are either in grade 11 or 12 and have an interest in a career in a skilled trade.
