Raising Resilient Children

Resilience is being able to bounce back from difficult times, setbacks and other significant challenges. It includes being able to deal effectively with pressures, and get through tough times with good outcomes. When your child is faced with a problem, listen to your child. When he/she feels understood, ask the question: What do you think we should do? In this way, we can support and guide our children to make good decisions by thinking through various possibilities and choosing the one that makes good sense to solve the problem.

Primary and Junior EQAO Assessments



Each year, Ontario students in Grade 3 and Grade 6 write province-wide assessments of their literacy and mathematics skills. EQAO's Assessments of Reading, Writing and Mathematics, Primary Division (Grades 1–3) and Junior Division (Grades 4–6) are based on the same reading, writing and mathematics curriculum expectations that teachers use to structure students' daily classroom experiences.

Each student who writes an assessment receives an Individual Student Report that describes his or her achievement on the assessment. The results are reported according to the province's four achievement levels. These are the same levels teachers use in the classroom and on report cards to evaluate students' progress. The provincial standard is Level 3, which corresponds to a B- to B+.

Your child's EQAO results are an important, objective indicator of his or her reading, writing and mathematics achievement in relation to the provincial standard. Staff and students at St. Martha have been working hard all year to prepare for the provincial assessments of reading, writing and math. EQAO assessments will take place province- wide during the weeks of May 22-June 4th, 2018. Shortly, Grade 3 and 6 Parents/Guardians will receive more information regarding specific dates of the assessments at St. Martha.

Homework Hygiene

As a follow up to our presentation of SCREENAGERS, please note that parents may subscribe to receive tips every



Tuesday to help families manage screen time at home. The following is taken from a SCREENAGER/ Tech Talk Tuesday with

homework tips they call *Homework Hygiene*.

- Do homework after physical activity because the body is physiologically primed to learn more efficiently in this state.
- Start with the task that they least want to do and set the alarm for 10 minutes. That helps get over the hurdle of doing it. Then, after the 10 minutes, coming back to it will be much easier.
- ➤ Have a rule that all tech is off by a certain time so homework cannot be done late at night.
- ➤ Put phones out of sight and decide when it is reasonable for a tech or phone break.
- Put in place other breaks, not just checking phone, such as playing with a pet, or doing part of a crossword puzzle with them.

Beyond Classrooms Program

This curriculum focused program moves teachers and their classrooms into community museums, art galleries and community sites for an entire week. The host site becomes an extension of the teacher's classroom, where he or she can help students enhance their literacy, critical thinking and problem solving skills, in an authentic environment. During the week of April 23-27th, 2018, Mrs. Couture and her Grade 5-6 Class will be taking the City Bus to the Miller Museum of Geology on Queen's University campus to study and learn for the week. MSAC: Tenth Year Anniversary

Do you ever wonder how to make your voice heard about your education? Well, as of 2018, the Minister's Student Advisory Council (MSAC) has reached its tenth year as an operating council. For the most part, not many people know about the council and what happens there. MSAC is a group that is formed every May and is composed of sixty students from every corner of Ontario to talk about student issues and student voice because it's the student's education in the end. Students from grades seven to twelve apply each year to be able to share their stories of speaking up for what they believe is right. This year 400 students applied to be part of MSAC. Since 2008, MSAC has been a platform for many to share their voices and insights at a provincial level. Students share their ideas with their fellow peers and can combine other ideas to build stronger and better ones.

There is a wide spectrum of voices including Indigenous, people who struggle with inclusivity, victims of bullying, military kids, and many more. MSAC also wants to hear from everyone and that includes you. Some achievements that MSAC has achieved

include that grade eight students can start their volunteer hours in the summer before they start grade nine, the start of School Mental Health ASSIST which provides resources to promote student mental health across Ontario, and the start of the Education Equity Action Plan which will help all Ontario students reach their full potential.

In honour of the tenth anniversary, MSAC invited past and present members to a celebration for MSAC's impact on Ontario. This was the first of three events that the new cohort attends. For me, I was finally able to meet my future peers and also meet past members for advice. There was someone from every region of Ontario and it was interesting to hear about other student's stories about speaking up. Besides meeting other students, we all got to meet the Minister of Education Indira Naidoo-Harris, Olympic hurdler Sekou Kaba, and the Premier of Ontario Kathleen Wynne. Kathleen Wynne let us ask her questions about student voice and about student opinions about issues in school system.



There was a panel of past members as well where we got to ask them about their favourite moments when they were in MSAC and how they brought student voice with them in their post-secondary schooling. We did a lot of group collaboration and talked a lot about the future of student voice. We bounced

ideas off of each other and we wrote them down on sticky notes. The sticky notes were then given to the on-site graphic designer who then made a poster with our ideas. This year's theme is student well-being, and we would like to hear your thoughts. As a member of the new MSAC cohort this was a great experience!

Early Learning Kindergarten Registrations

We are now accepting registrations for our Full Day Early Learning Kindergarten Program for September 2018. Your child is eligible to enroll in the Full Day Early Learning Kindergarten program if he or she will be 4 years of age by December 31, 2018. You can access registration forms by coming into the Office or online through the Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board's website. Please also include your child's Baptismal Certificate, Birth Certificate and Immunization Record. Parents/Guardians and children who will be beginning school in September are invited to our Kindergarten Open House on Monday, June 11th from 3:15-4:45 p.m. information will follow.

Did you know the importance of *play-based learning* in the early years?

Play lies at the core of innovation and creativity. It provides opportunities for learning in a context in which children are at their most receptive. Play and academic work are not distinct categories for young children, and learning and doing are also inextricably linked for them (Full Day Early Learning Kindergarten Program, 2010).

In play, children represent and transform the world around them, providing other children and adults with a window into their thoughts and perceptions, and often helping adults see the world in new ways (BC Early Learning Framework, 2008).

Play expands intelligence, stimulates the imagination, encourages creative problem solving and helps develop confidence, self-esteem, and a positive attitude toward learning (Dr. Fraser Mustard).

Promoting our Mathematical Thinking

At school, we have been working in all classes to promote each child's mathematical thinking. The ability of students to explain what they know about a math concept and how they know it will enhance a deeper understanding of math concepts.

Further, when students engage in problem solving and communication, they are developing strong links to other learning processes. A problem-solving approach encourages students to reason their way to a solution or a new understanding. As students engage in reasoning, teachers further encourage them to make conjectures and justify solutions, orally and in writing. The communication and reflection that occur during and after the process of problem solving help students not only to articulate and refine their thinking but also to see the problem they are solving from different perspectives. This opens the door to recognizing the range of strategies that can be used to arrive at a solution. By seeing how others solve a problem, students can begin to reflect on their own thinking (a process known as "metacognition") and the thinking of others, and to consciously adjust their own strategies in order to make their solutions as efficient and accurate as possible.

School Lockdown Drill and Practice

It is a requirement of all schools to practice emergency lockdown drills twice a year. This procedure enables all students and staff to respond to an



emergency situation. During a lockdown drill, steps are taken to isolate students and staff from danger by requiring everyone to remain inside the building. We will have our second practice on April 25th, 2018 in the morning. A letter will be sent home with additional information regarding the practice lockdown.
