Smooth Traffic Flow

In order to facilitate a smooth and continuous flow of traffic in our drop off and pick up zone, drivers are reminded not to park and wait in the drop off zone as it blocks other traffic wishing to proceed through and causes unnecessary delays in drop off procedures at the school. Drivers are asked to please use all available parking spaces on side streets around the school for longer stays. In addition, out of respect for residents in our school's immediate neighborhood, we respectively ask that parents and guardians who are dropping off and picking up children or attending a school event not park on the north side of Briscoe Street from Park Crescent to Sherwood Ave. Parking on the north side of Briscoe can often block residents' private driveways, make it difficult for residents to access their driveways and compromises sight lines when trying to access the street. The safety of our students walking on Briscoe as well as the needs of the residents who live on the street are of particular concern. Thank you for your cooperation to ensure everyone's safety.

Doing My Best Work during Term 2

As we head into Term Two of learning at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic School, students are encouraged to use all available resources at school to be successful life-long learners. Students are invited to reflect on the following strategies.

I can:

- ✓ Use Learning Goals to help me to know what I am learning about
- ✓ Include all the Success Criteria in my work
- ✓ Notice what counts in good quality work
- ✓ Use my inquiry skills to learn more about something
- ✓ Share my math thinking and reasoning with others in a variety of ways (proportional, spatial and algebraic thinking and reasoning)
- ✓ Accept that there could be more than one answer when I collaborate with other learners
- ✓ Choose a way to show my learning based on my strengths (poster, drama, report, brochure, film)
- ✓ Use technology to practice and showcase my learning so that others can learn too
- ✓ Use feedback from teachers, peers and myself to bump up my work and improve my learning
- ✓ Notice the work of others and celebrate their accomplishments
- ✓ Take pride in my learning and achievements

OFIP After-School Tutoring for Grade 3 and 6 Students

All students in Grades 3 and 6 are invited to take part in a free after school tutoring program aimed at reinforcing skills in reading, writing and math with focused intervention strategies. Our Learning Journey

As we prepare our students to demonstrate their best work and

thinking during daily reading response activities at school and at home, please know that our students will be showing what they know. Students will practice:

- ✓ Understanding explicitly stated information and ideas (use information from the text to support your answer)
- ✓ Understanding implicitly stated information and ideas (use information from the text and your own ideas to support your answer)
- ✓ Making connections between information and ideas in the reading selection and personal knowledge and experience in your answer

Parents can practice at home too. After reading a story, ask your son or daughter to retell the story in his or her own words. Then ask your son or daughter to determine what the author's message is. In other words, why do you think the author wrote the story? What does the author want us to learn or think more about? Whose voice or perspective is presented? Whose voice or perspective is not presented? How has the author used words or images to communicate the message? Does what you read change what you think about a topic?

Create a daily time to read together. Children respond well to routine, so if possible, make reading together something that you and your child look forward to every day. Here are some ideas about how to make the most of your time together:

- Set aside a special time each day when you can give your full attention to reading with your child
- Find out what your child is passionate about and learn as much as possible about this topic
- Go to the public library together or browse on line together
- Use books featuring your child's favorite character from a specific T.V. show
- Make use of websites from home or the public library
- Include a spot for games, puzzles, comics or software
