## POLICY STATEMENT

### ADMISSION TO CATHOLIC SCHOOLS

#### Rationale

The Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School board enjoys as its primary aim the development and maintenance of a learning environment in which Christ's teaching and our Catholic faith have a central place. Our students are both formed in their faith and educated to become citizens of the world. As such, Catholic schools exist primarily to meet the needs of Catholic students and families.

#### Guiding Principles

- All elementary school-aged children, whose parent(s)/guardian(s) direct taxation to the Separate School Board shall be admitted to the geographically appropriate school under the jurisdiction of the Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board.
- Parent(s)/guardian(s) of elementary aged children will provide evidence to the school principal that the student has the right to attend a Roman Catholic school. The right to attend derives from the direction of property tax assessment to the Separate School Board, proof of age of the child, and, possibly, a Roman Catholic Baptismal Certificate.
- Catholic Parent(s)/guardian(s) of eligible elementary school-aged children lacking Catholic Baptism or reception into the Catholic Church will be strongly encouraged by the Principal to seek Catholic Baptism or reception for their children.
- Principals of elementary schools are empowered to admit students of another faith if the principal is of the belief that the parent(s)/guardian(s) are supportive of the Catholic values, beliefs and culture present in the school and will support their children being part of a faith-based school system.
- Subject to Board Policies regarding transportation and school boundaries, any secondary school aged student within the board's jurisdiction may choose to attend a Catholic secondary school. All Secondary school school-aged students and their parent(s)/guardian(s) must accept and support the distinctive Catholic character, culture and rituals that are an integral part of the Catholic secondary school community.
- Elementary and Secondary aged students who, but for Ontario residency status, would otherwise meet the admission policy of the Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board, may be admitted pending payment of tuition fees.

## ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES

### ADMISSION TO CATHOLIC SCHOOLS (Policy Statement: Admission to Catholic Schools)

#### Purpose

The mission of the Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board is to both form and inform students in a Roman Catholic faith-based educational culture. Eligible students come from a variety of backgrounds and experiences with respect to the Catholic Church and therefore, it is necessary to articulate processes for admission to Catholic Schools and to foster linkages with the local Parishes.

#### Procedures

##### Admission to Elementary Schools for Roman Catholic Students

1. Subject to the provisions of the Education Act (Ontario), all elementary school-aged students having the right of attendance shall be admitted to the geographically appropriate school under the jurisdiction of the Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board. The right of attendance defined in the Education Act (Ontario) means that all elementary school-aged children of parent(s)/guardian(s) who direct their taxes in support of a Separate School Board are eligible to attend a Catholic school. The completion of a Student Registration Form is required (Form A).
2. A student shall be allowed to enroll in Junior Kindergarten in September of that calendar year during which the student becomes four years of age.
3. A student shall be enrolled in Senior Kindergarten in September of that calendar year during which the student becomes five years of age.
4. A student shall be admitted by the Principal of an elementary school when the parent(s)/guardian(s) submit(s) evidence that a student has the right to attend a Roman Catholic School. Evidence includes the following:
  - a) direction of taxes to the Separate School Board; Principals shall ensure that parent(s)/guardian(s) complete the direction of taxation forms if they cannot provide direct evidence at the time of registration;

- b) proof of age of student through (Roman Catholic) Baptismal Certificate or Birth Certificate (copies to be filed in OSR).
- 5. Catholic parent(s)/guardian(s) whose children have the right of attendance and children are lacking Roman Catholic Baptism or reception into the Church will be provided with information outlining the philosophy of Catholic schools and expectations of Religion and Family Life programs, along with encouragement for Catholic Baptism (Appendix 1).
- 6. The principal of an elementary school shall admit a student who is a ward of the Children's Aid Society where a Roman Catholic Baptismal Certificate or proof of reception to the Church is received.

#### Admission to Elementary Schools of Children of Other Faiths

- 1. The principal of an elementary school is empowered to admit students of another faith who do not enjoy a statutory right to attend, subject to the provisions of this Administrative Procedure.
- 2. Requests for admission of a non-Catholic student shall be made by the parent(s)/guardian(s) of the student, in writing, to the elementary school principal in sufficient time to allow for thoughtful consideration of the request by that principal (Appendix 2). Following a personal meeting, the Principal will provide a response in writing.
- 3. The principal shall provide the parent(s)/guardian(s) with information outlining the philosophy of Catholic schools and the expectations of the Religion and Family Life programs which can be found in the resource, "One in the Spirit, One in Learning", posted on the Board Website.
- 4. In considering a request for admission, the principal shall attend to the following areas:
  - (i) the reasons given by the parent(s)/guardian(s) for their request to register the child(ren) in a Catholic school ( Appendix 3);
  - (ii) the level of support which the parent(s)/guardian(s) can provide to the student to foster the practice of their own faith and the support they are willing to provide in relation to Catholic values and beliefs presented at school;
  - (iii) the age of the child(ren) and particular grade levels involved;
  - (iv) the enrolment capacity of the school and, in particular, the class(es) to which the child(ren) would be assigned (i.e., primary class size cap);
  - (v) an understanding that permission given to a student to attend under the provisions of this policy shall be subject to annual review; and
  - (vi) informing the parent(s)/guardian(s) of their decision to admit the child(ren) by June 15<sup>th</sup> of each year.
- 5. Where a principal has concerns about an admission request, (s)he shall forward the request to the appropriate supervisory officer.

## Admission to Secondary Schools

1. Subject to Board Policies regarding transportation and school boundaries, any secondary school-aged student within the Board's jurisdiction, may choose to attend a Catholic secondary school (Section 42 (1) Education Act (Ontario)). The completion of a Student Registration Form is required (Form B).
2. All Secondary school aged students and their parent(s)/guardian(s) must accept and recognize the distinctive Catholic character and culture that pervades the Catholic secondary school community and must be willing to support its purpose, goals and expectations.

## Freedom of Information Consent Form

1. The Freedom of Information Consent Form (Form C) must be completed and filed annually in compliance with provisions of the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act, 1989.

## Payment of Tuition Fees

1. In all cases, where a student is admitted for whom the Ministry of Education does not provide education funding, tuition fees would apply as outlined in the Payment of Tuition Fees Administrative Procedures.
