In the Gospel of this weekend, Jesus is on a journey "through one town and village after another, teaching as he made his way to Jerusalem." A journey always implies a destination. Jerusalem is Jesus' destination. The Evangelist Luke rarely tells us about the places through which Jesus passes. He only mentions the beginning of the journey in Lk 9:51, the middle of the journey in Lk 17:11 and of course, the end of the journey in Lk 18:35; 19:1. In this way, Luke describes the momentum and progression of Jesus' journey, his clarity of focus, and his resolve and determination to get to the end.

What life lesson does Luke want to teach us? Most likely, he is suggesting to us that the objective of our life should be clear, and we should decidedly assume it like Jesus did. Nobody ever knows tomorrow. So as we set out on the journey of life, the places, situations, circumstances we go through are not always clear and definitive. However, what is certain is our ultimate objective, namely, Jerusalem our happy home! This is what Jesus considers most important and therefore commands us to "strive to enter through the narrow door." The narrow character of the door of salvation calls for self-control and self-discipline on our part: "Therefore lift your drooping hands and strengthen your weak knees, and make straight paths for your feet, so that what is lame may not be put out of joint, but rather be healed."

The icing on the cake is God's vision for the world as the prophet Isaiah envisions. God's plan is to gather all nations and tongues together to see his glory. So, will only a few be saved? By no means! To Timothy, St. Paul wrote: "God desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1Tim 2:4). It is for this reason that God sent Jesus Christ his only begotten Son, "that whoever believes in him should not perish but have everlasting life" (Jn. 3:16). If you truly believe, why not thank God for the gift of your personal Savior, Jesus Christ!
