Those who are absent on the 12th will have their pictures taken the following morning, Wednesday, September 13th. These pictures will be available to you for purchase. Students will be required to pay for their photo package on the day that the photos are taken. Terry Fox Run

The 26th Annual Terry Fox Run will be held on Sunday, September 17th, 2006. Before Terry died, he knew that an annual event would be held to commemorate his Marathon of Hope. It would be called, appropriately, The Terry Fox Run. The first Terry Fox Run in 1981 attracted 300,000 participants across Canada and raised \$3.5 million. To date, more than \$400 million has been raised worldwide for cancer research in Terry's name.

Let's make this a special year and celebrate Terry's legacy. As a community let us join the Greater Kingston community in responding to Terry's dream of finding a cure for cancer. "The Run" is a non-competitive event which begins at **2:00 at Woodbine Park**, near Holy Cross. The route is a 10 km course which you may WALK, RUN, BIKE, use a wheelchair or inline skates. Last year, Holy Cross was awarded the Barry Brady Trophy for the third consecutive year for having the largest number of high school students involved in the run. Let's build on our past success and get even more Crusaders involved this year. The emphasis of the event isn't on how much you raise, but that you participate in Terry's memory and help him finish his Marathon of Hope.

As Terry said in 1980: "If you've given a dollar, you are part of the Marathon of Hope."

School Dance

The first school dance will be held on **Friday**, **September15**th from 7:30-11:00 p.m. The theme for this dance is *Under the H-Sea*. All are encouraged to wear clothing that expresses this nautical theme but, of course, is also modest in accordance with our school dress code. Extracurricular Activities at Holy Cross

Get involved! The extracurriculars offered at Holy Cross are supported by the teachers, administrators, Board office officials and support staff because of the contribution that extracurriculars make to the general educational experience of our students. Holy Cross Athletics

The fall of 2006 sees the return of a strong extracurricular athletics program at Holy Cross. Tryouts and practices begin the first week of September for all teams in preparation for the fall sports program in the Kingston area. This fall will see no less than eight teams carrying the green and silver of Holy Cross. The commitment of our student athletes and coaches generates dividends for all in our community. The parental support our teams have grown accustomed to over the years is most welcomed and appreciated. Grade 9 students should not hesitate to get involved. There are a wide range of teams to join and all are age appropriate. High school sports are a great way to develop lasting friendships while learning and developing many skills. The values, beliefs and invaluable life skills which school sports provide allow our student-athletes the opportunity to fully develop themselves. The Ontario Federation of School Athletic Association, OFSAA, operates with a Five Year Eligibility and a Transfer Eligibility Rule. Student-athletes now have a maximum of five years of eligibility to compete in high school athletics. Any student who has transferred into Holy Cross from another high school remains ineligible for all sports until they go through the transfer appeal process and are ruled upon. Any transfer student should contact Mr. Tim Pendergast, Athletic Director to begin the appeal process. The costs of running an extracurricular athletic program are great. Our teams are most fortunate to have the financial support of the Holy Cross Students' Council. Even with this support, user fees are required for all sports at Holy Cross. User fees for individual teams are listed below and are due in full for all students on all teams before their first competition. Have a great season and we hope to see you on the sidelines supporting the Green and Silver Crusaders of Holy Cross.

We are coming off a strong 2005 season and are looking to build on our successes, with the goal of making this coming year our best season yet! We have the foun-

<u>Smoking Restrictions - Grade Nine and Ten</u> Students

Beginning this September, students in Grade Nine and Ten are prohibited from smoking at Holy Cross. Therefore, Grade Nine and Ten students are not allowed in the smoking area and are not allowed to be in possession of cigarettes or tobacco products. If a Grade Nine or Ten student is found smoking or in possession of cigarettes, they will be suspended from school. Smoking is the number one preventable cause of premature death and disease in Ontario.

Smoking and Student Gathering Areas

It is the policy of our School Board that smoking is not allowed on their property and it is a distinct expectation that all will respect this policy. We recognize that the decision to smoke or not to smoke is an individual one, but we sincerely hope that in the face of mounting evidence with regard to the risk of our health that anyone thinking about beginning or ending "the habit" will give it serious thought. Students who smoke must do so either off the property or along the northwest corner (by the school sign). Smoking on the property will result in fines by the Health Unit's Tobacco Enforcement Officer who regularly patrols the area.

Students wanting to quit smoking should listen for further information about our Quit4Life program, to be implemented later in the fall, or can visit www.quit4life.com to find out more information.

Benefits of quitting smoking:

- Within 8 hours, carbon monoxide level drops in your body and the oxygen level in your blood increases to normal.
- Within 48 hours, your sense of smell and taste improves and your chances of having a heart attack go down.
- Within 72 hours, your lung capacity increases and bronchial tubes relax, making breathing easier.
- Within 2 weeks, the nicotine is removed from your body.
- Within 3 months, circulation improves and lung functioning increases up to 30 %.
- Within 6 months, coughing, sinus congestion, fatigue, and shortness of breath improve.
- Within 1 year, risk of smoking-related heart attack is cut in half, and your risk for cavities is lower.
- Within 10 years, risk of dying from lung cancer is cut in half
- Within 15 years, risk of dying from a heart attack is equal to a person who never smoked!

Want to Fight Big Tobacco?

Generation Empowerment is in its second year in Kingston and the surrounding area. Any student, or group of students, interested in learning more about leading tobacco awareness activities should check the website www.takechargecrew.ca, see Terrie Hoey or Ms. Daniel for further information. The deadline for orientation registration is September 22, 2006. Get involved; show the tobacco companies that youth don't want to be manipulated, in spite of the \$11.2 billion a year they spend on advertising.

2006 - 2007 Crusader Student Activity Fee

Most students have now paid their student activity fee, which covers the Holy Cross Agenda, the Students' Council ID Card, a Holy Cross Spirit T-shirt, the DVD Year Disc, and a personalized 2006 – 2007 Holy Cross Yearbook. Students from Grades 10 – 12 must pay \$66.00. The Grade Nine rate is \$83.00, which also includes a French Cahier and a school lock. Students may opt out of receiving the yearbook by signing the "opt out" form. For parents with more than one child at Holy Cross, a reduction of \$4.00 per additional child is available.

The value of the items purchased individually is much greater than the actual comprehensive fee. By ordering in bulk, Holy Cross is able to pass the savings on to the community and Students' Council is better able to support the extra-curriculars that make Holy Cross such a great place to be.

Counsellor's Corner

Course Load

All students in Grades 9, 10, 11 are required to carry a course load of 4 courses each semester. All students in Grade 12 are required to carry a minimum of 3 courses each semester.

Course Changes/Deletions

Students are to consult with a counselor prior to any decisions being made to their timetable. It is "advised" that any course changes required be dealt with by the end of the first week of the semester. Further to this, it is "required" that all changes be completed by the end of the second week of the semester. **No changes to schedules will occur after September 15**th.
