UNIFORM POLICY

As we begin the second semester and new classes and routines are forming, we revisit existing expectations at Holy Cross. In particular, we expect that students will be in full compliance with our uniform policy as outlined in the Code of Conduct, found in student agendas and on our school website, wwwhctoday.ca.

I encourage parents to see that their sons and daughters wear the proper uniform to Holy Cross. The uniform must be worn modestly; kilts are expected to be no shorter than two inches from the top of the knee and shirts / blouses must be neither too loose nor too tight. Throughout the day, students should wear dress shoes, and have buttons done up and shirts tucked in.

We all have a role to play! It is our expectation that parents will give full support to the wearing of uniform, and ensure, with the student, that the uniform is ready for wearing on each school day. We suggest that the students themselves should take on much of this responsibility. As you may be aware, students who arrive at school missing some part of the uniform must report to the office before classes begin and often, we are able to loan uniforms for the day. Students who do not return loaned items will face consequences such as study hall.

A progressive system of intervention will be put into place to deal with uniform violations, up to and including suspension from school for persistent opposition to authority. Girls who roll up their kilt or continuously wear too short a kilt will have their parents notified and will receive school consequences. Some students may be advised to let down the hem of their kilts. Students who demonstrate an unwillingness to comply and cooperate with their teachers and other school authorities on this matter will not remain in our school.

INTEGRITY ON THE INTERNET

Our school community has recently faced some tough but important discussions surrounding use of the internet as a social networking tool and how actions at home can have ramifications at school. This issue is a growing one, which neither arose out of a single incident nor will be put to rest in one fell swoop.

Please rest assured that we take the issue of cyberbullying very seriously. No member of our community should be demeaned in this way. We appreciate the support of our parents and broader community as we help students to learn that their actions on the worldwide web reflect their characters and, collectively, reflect our school.

As school authorities, we continue to educate, in collaboration with families and parishes, and we will also continue to implement incremental and appropriate consequences to inappropriate, offensive, defamatory and / or threatening messages. Dr. Wendy Craig, a leading local expert on bullying, will return to Holy Cross to lead a schoolwide presentation on the topic of cyberbullying. We ask parents at home and teachers in the classroom to continue discussions surrounding the importance of maintaining one's dignity and the dignity of others at home and at school, in every medium. At school, students are only to access internet for educational purposes: sites such as Facebook, Youtube and MySpace are forbidden and MSN Messenger is not to be used. To live in Christ; to love as Christ — such is the basis of our faith, indeed, the foundation of the Holy Cross community. Let's let our lives bear witness to our mission statement.

PASTORAL UPDATE

It was with deep sadness that Holy Cross heard of the death of **Archbishop Anthony G. Meagher** on **January 14**th, **2007**. Throughout the years of his episcopacy in this Archdiocese, Archbishop Meagher touched the lives of many people. He had a special love for youth and we will never forget his leadership during World Youth Days in Toronto in 2002 and the many catecheses that he held for youth afterwards. Representatives from all the schools of our Archdiocese, including Holy Cross, attended his funeral Mass at St. Mary's Cathedral which was a deeply moving and inspiring celebration. We continue to mourn his death and to pray for him, our Archdiocese, and for his family.

THE MEMORIAL AND FULL COURT PRESS AGAINST CANCER February will be a busy month for the athletic department as the winter season comes to an end and playoffs begin. Added to this excitement is the annual cancer fundraiser, "The Memorial" which takes place at the beginning of the month.

The Memorial consists of an elementary school basketball tournament, The Full Court Press, and a meeting between the boys' basketball teams from Holy Cross and Regi. The elementary school tournament will take place on **Friday, February 2**nd and **Saturday, February 3**rd at Holy Cross and Regiopolis-Notre Dame. The high school basketball games will take place on **Thursday, February 8**th with the Juniors beginning the night at 5:00 and the senior game to follow.

On Thursday, February 8th, The Memorial Basketball games will be hosted here at Holy Cross with the Junior Varsity game beginning at 5:00 and the Senior game scheduled to begin at 7:00. The Memorial was established by Paul Halligan in 1989 as a testament to a young basketball player, Peter Carty who lost his fight against cancer at the age of 23. Paul Halligan died in July 1997 at the age of 34 as a victim of the very disease that had taken his friend, Peter Carty thirteen years earlier. The popular "Toonie for a Non-uni" in support of the Memorial will take place on Thursday, February 8th. Students can purchase a non-uniform ticket from their period 1 teacher which not only exempts them from the uniform policy for the day but also makes them eligible to win a Memorial prize drawn at the end of the day. Plan now to attend one of the highlights of the high school sports season and contribute to the fight against cancer.

This event began as a tribute to Peter Carty's courage, but continues as a memorial to all whose family and friends battle cancer, as we unite in sport and spirit.

AFTER-SCHOOL LITERACY PROGRAM

The after-school literacy program, designed to boost reading and writing skills and to help students gain confidence in preparation for the **Literacy Test** on **Thursday, March 29th**, will begin in the second week of February. This program will run on **Mondays** and **Wednesdays** from **2:45** to **4:00**, beginning **Monday, February 12th**. All students must successfully complete the Literacy Test (or subsequently enroll in and complete the Grade 12 Literacy Course) in order to obtain an Ontario Secondary School Diploma. SPECIAL EDUCATION AND RESOURCE

There are a variety of scholarships available for students with learning disabilities. Imperial Tobacco Canada Limited Scholarship for Disabled Students offers \$5,000 annually towards college or university and its deadline is June 1st; the Mattison Endowment Fund Scholarship for Disabled Students is a one year award of \$2,500 for undergraduate studies in a degree-granting program (deadline of June 1st); the Roy Cooper Scholarship Award 2007 offers a \$1,000 award for students with a learning disability entering engineering or a physical sciences discipline in university or college (deadline of May 28th). There are also four LDAC scholarships, all with application deadlines of May 15th, for students with learning disabilities. Other exciting opportunities through the resource department include the Spring On-Line Course offered by Queen's and Trent Universities, for students with learning disabilities heading to university or college in the fall. This course begins March 20th and is designed to help students learn more about their own learning styles, self-advocacy skills, adaptive technologies, and post-secondary learning strategies. Finally, several of our students, along with students from Regiopolis-Notre Dame, are participating in the Queen's University Gr8 Transitions program in a Peer Support Role. This program helps Grade Eight students with learning disabilities to transition successfully to high school. Beginning in February, our students will participate in Peer Support training sessions. COURSE LOAD

All students in Grades 9, 10, 11 are required to carry a course load of 4 courses each semester. All students in Grade 12 are required to carry a minimum of 3 courses each semester.

COURSE CHANGES/DELETIONS

Students are to consult a counselor prior to making any changes to their timetable. It is "advised" that any required course changes be dealt with by the end of the first week of semester two. THE ONTARIO YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM (OYAP)

There are over 150 skilled trades in Ontario, and forecasts indicate there are extreme shortages of workers in many of these areas. The province expects to register 24,000 new apprentices this year; however, there are indications that this number will not keep up with the on-going demand for skilled trade workers. To assist in this regard, OYAP helps young people to "jump start" their careers while still enrolled in high school. Full-time senior students who are at least 16 years of age and have an interest in a skilled trade/occupation are eligible to apply.

<u>Information</u> about OYAP may be obtained from the guidance department or cooperative education teacher in any of the Board's high schools.

IMMUNIZATION MESSAGE

Students between the ages of 14 and 16 need a booster of tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis (dTaP) called Adacel. They are also eligible for Meningococcal C vaccine between the ages of 15 and 19. KFL&A Public Health will be holding clinics at all secondary schools in the new year. Our clinic will be held during the morning of Monday, March 28th. If your child receives a booster at the doctor's office, ask the office to send the information to KFLA&A Public Health or you may call the automated vaccine reporting line at 613-549-1232 ext. 445 or 1-800-267-7875 ext. 445 to give them an update.

BAND EQUIPMENT AND OUR CD FUNDRAISING:

This year's **Katharine Splinter Memorial Christmas Recital** was a huge success. Thank you to all who supported this performance. Please rest assured that we have noted the length of the program; while all were impressed with the breadth of the literature, we will cut the time significantly for next year. Thank you again for supporting our phenomenal student musicians.

As you are probably aware, the performance was recorded by recording engineer **David Dawe** of Summit Sound Recording Studio. This recording has since been mastered and is in the finishing stages of production. Sales of this CD entitled, Urban Dances, will go toward the purchase of new, greatly-needed band equipment and in particular a full set of Majestic Symphonic Timpani. When we did research in the Fall to add 2 timpani to our existing 2 to create a full complement, it quickly became apparent that it was far more economical and musically more sound, to purchase a full set. As a result, we were able to purchase a full set at a cheaper price than had we purchased just 2. To help cover the costs of this once-inbandtime opportunity, we are asking each student, to sell 5 CDs at a cost of \$10 each. Please provide a cheque for \$50, made payable to Holy Cross, to either of us by the end of this week. The CDs should arrive within the next three weeks. The CD sounds great and is a wonderful memento of our students' achievements.

TEXTBOOKS FOR SEMESTER 2

All students should now be in possession of the necessary text-books for this semester. We wish to emphasize at this time that the condition of each book is the student's responsibility. We realize that all books are not in pristine condition; thus any tattered or dilapidated book should be brought immediately to the Library for repair or replacement if possible. We often hear in June that "that was how the book was when I got it." This is not an acceptable excuse, especially when students may bring "injured" books to the Library to be cared for at any time. ONTARIO SECONDARY SCHOOL LITERACY TEST (OSSLT)

The Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test has been scheduled by the Ministry of Education for Thursday, March 29th. All Grade 10 students who are working towards an OSSD will write the test. Holy Cross will be conducting the test between 8:30 and 11:15 a.m. All Grade 10 students will be reviewing their literacy skills once/twice a week for a four week period prior to the test date. All components of the test will be reviewed with students during these classes. All Grade 10 students will receive a copy of a workbook entitled. "The Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test Workbook" that they will be using in their literacy classes. All students are encouraged to take this workbook home for continuous review. Once again, you may obtain practice materials, student resources, and sample questions and answers at the Education Quality and Accountability Office website at www.eqao.com under the link 'Student Resources', or from our web site at www.hctoday.ca. Parents/guardians will be advised in writing of their son/daughter's test outcome. Students who are not successful will retake the test next year, or may enrol in the literacy course.
