Christmas decorations are quickly going up and the First Advent Candle has been lit as we begin another Advent Season here at Holy Cross. Students and staff will have an opportunity to celebrate **Reconciliation** on **Thursday**, **December** 4th and to celebrate as a community at our **Advent School Masses** on **Thursday**, **December** 18th. Congratulations to members of C.I.C.S. who were part of this year's **Toronto Street Retreat** from November 20 – 21st. The students worked with the homeless on the streets of Toronto, visited Heather Brady, a Holy Cross graduate who now works with refugees at Romero House and volunteered at St. Francis Table which provides inexpensive, nutritious meals for the poor. Eden Cameron, one of the participants, writes of her experience: "The most memorable part of the Street Retreat was the street patrol we did Thursday night. To actually talk to some of Toronto's homeless and help them personally leaves a lasting impression on you. It makes you think about all the luxuries we possess in our lives and how we so often take them for granted. The homeless people we saw were sleeping in shop doorways and even on the sidewalks, trying to find any shelter from the cold wind of the night. When we gave them bagged lunched and socks, I knew we were making a difference." All agreed this was an eye-opening experience of what it is like to be homeless and poor on the streets of our largest city. Members of CICS and others will also be participating in a Development & Peace Student Leadership Retreat on Thursday, December 11th at Regiopolis-Notre Dame CHS. See Mr. Forster to sign up.

Parents of students on an IEP, who have not yet returned a signed consultation form, which was mailed to them with the draft IEP in October, should do so as soon as possible. As of now, 105 contact records, out of a total of 261 IEPs, have been returned. Thank you for your co-operation in this matter.

Queen's University and **Trent University**, in collaboration with our school board and two neighbouring school boards, are offering a program called **On-Line to Success**, which will teach students more about their own learning disability, self-advocacy skills, adaptive technology, and learning strategies for college and university. This course, an integral transition component for students with learning disabilities, is available to students planning on attending any university, college or apprenticeship program in Ontario next year. MOTHERS AGAINST DRUNK DRIVING (MADD) PRESENTATIONS

Impaired driving is the number one PREVENTABLE cause of death among teens in Canada. (<u>www.madd.ca</u>) *Dead on Arrival* is geared towards students in grades 7-12 and is played across 3 giant screens. It is a bold and intensely emotional story of the lasting effects that one wrong decision can make. The show explores characters whose lives are catapulted into unforeseen situations in the aftermath of an impaired driving crash. The 2008-2009 show is also hosted by Canadian Radio Music Award Nominee, *Live On Arrival* Front man, **Robb Nash**, shares his personal story of having been pronounced dead on arrival after a terrible car crash. Amazingly, Robb came back to life and has since been given a second chance. He shares his message to youth across Canada to not only seize the moment but to make good decisions and always get to your destination "alive on arrival". The show concludes with a moving tribute of photos, names and dates of teen victims across Canada.

SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORTATION EDUCATION PROGRAM – HEALTH UNIT A group of our students, along with Mrs. Patsy Hawkins-Hogan,

attended the Sustainable Transportation Education Program at the **Health Unit**. TAKE OUR KIDS TO WORK DAY

275 Grade Nine students from Holy Cross C.S.S. participated in *Take Our Kids to Work Day* with a parent, relative or family friend on Wednesday, November 5th. Students found themselves in a variety of workplace situations including offices, penitentiaries, and retail businesses. Many students were treated to tours, career presentations and free lunches. Some felt that the contact might prove useful to them later when seeking part-time employment, and many concluded that the day served as a valuable form of career exploration. One Grade 9 student commenting on her mother's career choice, said, "Now I know what I *don't* want to be!"

ONTARIO YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

The Conference Board of Canada estimates Ontario could be short more than 360,000 skilled employees by 2025, and more than 560,000 by 2030.

The ALCDSB continues to develop programs in numerous areas that lead to a variety of career pathways. The Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP) has been profiled as one of the pathways that is making significant gains in providing opportunities for students. OYAP is a school-to-work transition program offered throughout all of Ontario's secondary schools. Full time students in grades 11 and 12 earn cooperative education credits for their graduation diploma through work placements in skilled trades. Students who are committed to pursuing this option as a career choice may also apply to start an apprenticeship. Of this group, many grade 12 students are able to complete Level 1 Apprenticeship Training (Theory) Programs in the areas of Hairstylist, Carpentry, and Brick and Stone Mason programs at St. Lawrence College; Automotive, Cook, and Early Childhood Education at Loyalist College; and the Construction and Craft Worker program offered at the Life Long Learning Centre.

Choosing a career pathway is a cooperative effort involving students, parents/guardians, teachers and guidance counsellors. In the case of OYAP, the equation has even more dimensions added where, in addition to the efforts from those above, the Ministry of Training Colleges and Universities, coop teachers, Technological Education teachers, OYAP Coordinators, employers and members of the community, Colleges and training providers, and other community agencies such as Job Connect, Career Edge, Keys Employment Services etc. are all partners in helping establish career paths for our students.

Who Should Consider OYAP? - Students who:

- 1 Are at least 16 years of age and have completed 16 credits
- 2 Are either in grade 11 or 12 and have an interest in a career in a skilled trade

Information about OYAP may be obtained from the guidance departments or cooperative education teachers in any of the Board's high schools. (web information at www.oyap.com). College/University Applications

Post secondary application workshops and information sessions have concluded. Although the **deadline for applications to OUAC** (University) is January 14th and OCAS (College) is February 2nd, the Holy Cross recommended date is **December 15th**. All PIN numbers for University applicants have arrived, and students should have stopped by Student Services to pick up theirs. PIN numbers are not required for college applications, however, students do require their OEN number which can be found on their report card.

EQAO GRADE NINE ASSESSMENT OF MATHEMATICS

In January 2009, Holy Cross students who are currently enrolled in a Grade 9 Applied or Academic course will join others in a provincewide standardized Grade Nine Math Test. This mandatory assessment will involve multiple choice questions, short answer and extended responses. This test, which is one component of the Secondary School Reform initiative, will be administered over two of the students' regular mathematics classes: Friday, January 16th and Monday, January ^{19th} for the Academic classes and Friday January 16th and Tuesday, January 20th for the Applied classes.
