Thanks From The Attendance Office

The attendance secretaries, Madeleine Picard and Madeline Bouvier would like to thank all of you for taking the time to call in when your son or daughter is ill, has an appointment or will be away for a day or two. It is greatly appreciated and alleviates having unnecessary calls go home at night. As we head into the last two months of school, please keep the following in mind:

- In some cases, parents advise teachers when his/her child is going to be absent, but not the attendance office. Although advising the student's teachers is a good practice, it is imperative that you advise the attendance office. It is the attendance office secretaries who enter the student's attendance code and reason for absence in Maplewood; not the teachers.
- It is imperative that a student signs in and out anytime he/she arrives at or departs from the school within the hours of 8:30 and 2:30; even if the student arrives between periods or during the lunch hour. If this practice is not followed, it is impossible to know when the student arrives or departs.
- When a student signs in late, the attendance office does not enter the student's attendance to LATE. The teacher does. It is the responsibility of the student to provide the teacher with his/her late slip at the end of class, ensuring the Maplewood entry reflects the late

arrival. The teacher has the option of changing the student's entry from ABSENT to LATE.

Student Services

Course Selection for 2019-2020

Course selection is now complete. Parents/Guardians are reminded to review their child's courses for next year on Maplewood or myBlueprint. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact your child's guidance counsellor. A reminder for next year's Grade 12 students planning to attend university - you need a minimum of six Grade 12 U or M classes, including the program's prerequisites, to be an eligible applicant.

On-line Summer School 2019

The Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board will offer online summer courses in English, Math, Co-op, and Civics/Careers (both in French and in English) from Tuesday, July 2nd - Monday, July 29th, 2019. Interested students can either pick up a registration form in Student Services or download a form from the RND website that must be signed by a parent/guardian to register for an on-line course. For more information, please refer to the eLearning Course Guidelines on the RND website or call Student Services. Please note that courses only run if there is sufficient enrolment.

The Limestone District School Board will not be offering In-school Summer School this year. However, students will have the option of taking co-operative education from July $2^{nd}-26^{th}$, 2019. Registration for Summer Session will take place May $1^{st}-31^{st}$, and students should see their Guidance Counsellor to register.

St. Lawrence College Grade 10 & 11 Connections

Dual Credit at St. Lawrence College

Dual credit programs are ministry-approved programs that allow high school students to take college or apprenticeship courses that count towards both the Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD) and a college certificate, diploma, or an apprenticeship certification. If you are a grade 12 or fifth year student and are interested in trying out a college course before you leave high school, dual credit might be for you. For more
